

The house sparrow is a year-round presence. However, they seem to be but irregular visitors to our feeders. The more reliable way to find them, commonly as little groups of 2-10 birds, is nesting in the signs of the local big-box stores, within 500 metres of our house! The house sparrow is not related to other North American sparrows, but rather is of the weaver finch family. They are well accustomed to living in proximity to humans, in urban settings.
