

Note: the chart displays the number of days in a given month in which the species was seen. This says nothing of total bird numbers: though commonly with this species one sees just one bird at a time. The total of sighting days is a minimum, as the observer was not present continuously. The pine siskin does appear in small numbers (1, 2, 3) at feeders, but on other occasions may bring 10, 20 or 100 friends (siskins, and also other winter birds, in mixed feeding flocks). Occurrence is very erratic: 94% of sightings days in a 20year period occurred in the first quarter of one year, 2009. Birds seen in just 3 of 23 years, 1999-2021.
